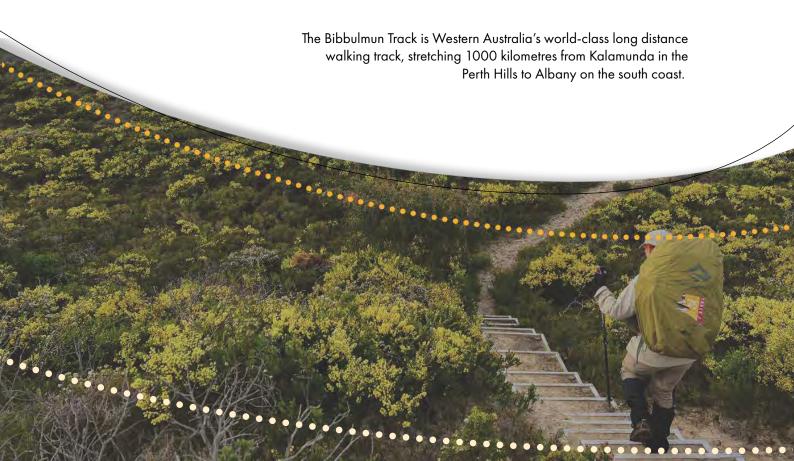

Whilst the Parks and Wildlife Service in the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions is the manager of the Track, the Bibbulmun Track Foundation is recognised as the primary focal point for community-based support and involvement.



Vision

The Bibbulmun Track Foundation is a vibrant, soundly managed organisation which utilises a strong community base to provide essential support for the ongoing management, maintenance and marketing of the Track.

Mission

To support the management of the Bibbulmun Track and encourage walkers to appreciate and support the Track for the benefit of future generations.

Strategic Priorities

- 1. Community participation contributing to physical and social well-being. We will continue to:
 - a. encourage and support walkers through information and events
 - b. attract, train and retain volunteers and acknowledge their contributions
- 2. Development of opportunities for tourism, employment and education. We will continue to:
 - a. develop, support and promote products and services for Track walkers
 - b. provide resources and facilities for schools and other groups
 - c. promote the communities through which the Track passes
- 3. Protection of the natural, cultural and heritage values of the Track. We will continue to:
 - a. maintain the Track in line with the BTF's vision
 - b. provide interpretation and environmental education as appropriate
 - c. develop a reconciliation action plan

- 4. Attraction of funds and other resources. We will continue to:
 - a. develop high quality relationships with all stakeholders
 - b. encourage membership, sponsorship and other contributions
 - c. develop income streams through products and services
- 5. Advocacy for protection of the Track from adverse impacts. We will continue to:
 - a. raise awareness of the Track at all levels of government
 - b. encourage community support for and pride in the Track
 - c. provide input into the formation of policies and development applications that would affect the Track.

Message from the Chair and Executive Director

We are pleased to present this report outlining our achievements for the 2023–2024 financial year.

A key theme was the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the Bibbulmun Track. The festivities began on 13 July 2023 with a ceremony in Kalamunda, followed by the departure of a group of walkers embarking on their end-to-end journey south.

The end-to-end and associated community celebrations provided an opportunity for hundreds to participate and for the BTF to strengthen its connection with the towns along the Track. A virtual hike allowed an additional 440 people to follow the journey online.

The 25-year milestone also gave us cause to reflect on the people who have made significant contributions to both the Bibbulmun Track and the Foundation over the years. In recognition of their dedication, we were pleased to present them with Honorary Life Memberships (see the list on page 12).

At the DBCA Volunteer Awards in December 2023, the Foundation was honoured to receive one of two Outstanding Service by a Community Group awards. This award recognised the organisation's efforts in maintaining and managing the Bibbulmun Track to an exceptionally high standard, ensuring it remains a quality experience for walkers.

Over the past 10 years, the number of volunteer hours has increased by 36%, and the number of maintenance reports received and processed has grown by 35%. The number of walkers has also risen by approximately 150%, with feedback indicating high appreciation for the Foundation's work.

Throughout the year, we continued to offer a range of opportunities for members and volunteers to join us at events, from social Sunday walks to members' nights. A particular highlight was the half-way party at Donnelly River Village during the Anniversary walk.

Behind the scenes, our website has been transitioned to a new platform, with several improvements made to both administrative and public-facing functionality. We also settled into our new premises in West Perth.

We extend our sincere thanks to DBCA's Parks and Wildlife Service for their support of the BTF this year, and the excellent progress made on the campsite upgrades.

Community Participation

25th Anniversary Celebrations

On 13 September 2023, over 140 people attended the final 25th Anniversary event in Albany to recognise and thank the many organisations and individuals who contributed to the development of the Track and those who continue to support and maintain it. This event marked the culmination of two months of celebrations, which included a guided end-to-end hike, ten community events, a school challenge, and a virtual hike.

Over 1,000 people took part, and we are deeply indebted to the army of volunteers who helped make the walk and the celebrations a success.

Events Program

Foundation held The 90 events and one extended tour, attracting 1,630 participants. Of these, 51 walks were associated with the 25th Anniversary, with 703 walkers participating in either a section or a short walk. Combined with our dav regular calendar of events, the program featured workshops, interpretive day walks, family-friendly strolls, week-long treks, and, of course, a guided 60-day end-to-end trek. Our workshops provide a wealth of information on navigation, gear, camp cooking, especially preparation for an end-to-end hike. continues Feedback from participants to be excellent, with many expressing appreciation for the leadership of our volunteer guides.

Groups on the Track

Throughout 2023, 243 groups, comprising a total of 4,001 walkers, spent 503 nights on the Track. The average group size was 15 walkers. These groups included schools, scouts, and commercial operators.

Independent Hikers

While it is difficult to determine exactly how many individual hikes took place on the Track last year, we do know that around 211,000 West Australians participated in bushwalking during 2022-23, up from 149,000 2021–22, representing a 41.6% increase.

Over the year, 201 people officially registered the completion of an end-to-end hike with us. This included 120 walkers from WA, 54 from interstate, and 27 international walkers.

Of these, 177 walkers completed the Track in a single journey, 23 completed it over multiple hikes, and one determined individual completed a double end-to-end (walking there and back continuously)!

A valuable source of data is the campsite log books. Thanks to the tremendous efforts of our data entry volunteers, over 500,000 logbook entries have now been recorded, providing valuable information on the demographics of our hikers.

Volunteer Guide Training Program

The Foundation developed and delivered a training program designed to introduce individuals to leading walks on marked trails. The program was primarily aimed at people interested leading walks for non-commercial organisations. Sessions were held in five regions, including the Great Southern, Wheatbelt, Gascoyne, Peel, and the Perth Hills.

The program was supported by a hiking participation grant from Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

Volunteer Recognition

The Track and walkers are supported by many individuals working as volunteers on Track and campsite maintenance, general and specialist office work, guiding, log book data entry, checking Track user counters, promotion at community events, distributing our walk brochures, participating on the Foundation Board, and special projects.

The Foundation currently coordinates around 440 volunteers who contributed a total of 36,304 hours during the 2023-24 financial year. Based on the formula used by Volunteering WA, their contribution to the Bibbulmun Track was worth over \$1.5 million.

Our volunteers are always appreciated for their support and efforts. In November 2023, Long Service and Annual Rewards were presented at functions in Perth, Capel, Albany, and Peaceful Bay.

DBCA Awards

The Foundation was well represented among the recipients of the 2023 DBCA annual Volunteer of the Year Award.

Ross Simpson (Sectional and Support Maintenance Volunteer), was recognised as the DBCA Volunteer of the Year. Fellow leading Support Maintenance Volunteer Mark Davidson received an Outstanding Service Award.

Both Ross and Mark and are truly deserving of this recognition, having contributed very significantly to the Track maintenance work for many years.

To complete the ceremony, the Foundation was one of two organisations awarded Outstanding Service by a Community Group. The other organisation was the Friends of the Cape to Cape Track, indicating the current strength of volunteer contribution within the trails industry in WA.

Protection of the natural, cultural and heritage values of the Track Eyes on the Ground Maintenance Program

Maintenance volunteers contributed over 20,720 volunteer hours in the 2023-24 financial year.

This was a slight reduction from the previous year, primarily due to reduced vegetation growth caused by a dry summer, leading to fewer logged maintenance hours.

Additionally, the increasing use of battery-powered hedge trimmers and reciprocating saws by volunteers has made maintenance easier and reduced the number of requests for assistance on individual sections.

Although a growing number of issues are reported via social media and the Foundation's website, the program continues to rely on sectional volunteers submitting maintenance reports 3-4 times a year to identify seasonal and ongoing problems along the Track.

Field Days remain a valuable opportunity for volunteers and Parks and Wildlife staff to collaborate, focusing on work, training, and building connections. This year, over 80 volunteers participated in Field Days at Tom Road, Nullaki, Mutton Bird, Frankland, Mt Dale, and Schafer campsites, where essential maintenance and infrastructure work was completed with the support of local district personnel.

Training and Skills Development

Developing the skills and knowledge of volunteers remains a key focus of the program.

Throughout the year, sectional volunteers were regularly invited to join Support Volunteer projects to expand their understanding of construction and erosion control methods and foster a sense of ownership over their sections of the Track.

When specific issues were reported, or new volunteers needed induction, one-on-one inspections or Support Volunteer assistance was arranged to provide guidance or suggestions for addressing the problems.

This year, the Department offered chainsaw operation and maintenance training, with 19 volunteers from Albany and Perth Hills districts completing a two-day course of theory and practical assessments, earning certificates of competency.

While chainsaws are not the preferred tool for volunteers, we hope similar training opportunities will be made available across other districts in the coming years to raise awareness about their correct and safe use.

Support Volunteer Projects

Volunteers were actively involved in several realignments and major projects along the Track throughout the year.

A key project was the replacement of dilapidated steps near Lake Williams. Over three campaigns, volunteers replaced 200+ steps and installed erosion controls along a 1.5km stretch in West Cape Howe National Park.

The project, supported by a \$27,871 grant from the WA Government's State NRM Program and assistance from Binalup Aboriginal Corporation rangers, saw volunteers contribute over \$60,000 in time, managing supplies, helicopter logistics, and construction.

Major Works

Other works managed by DBCA's **Recreation & Trails** contractors funded through the WA Recovery Plan and the Forest Enhancement Fund.

Track Realignments

Several small realignments were completed to improve the Track experience:

- Albany Highway: 215m of new trail was constructed to move the track away from the highway, creating a safer, more relaxed environment.
- Wilson Inlet Foreshore: A new path was built near Denmark, shifting the track off urban streets.
- Southern Terminus in Albany: New signage installed by the City of Albany, guiding the track along York St and Grey St West.

The Dookanelly to Possum Springs realignment (16km) progressed well, with most of the work completed by Support Volunteers and contractors, and opened in July 2024. This new route improves the Track by bypassing flood-prone areas and offering scenic views of the Murray River valley.

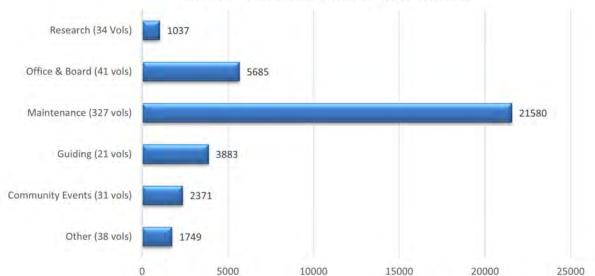
Further realignments are in the planning stages, including areas near Mt Dale, east of Mt Cooke, Wilshusen Rd, and Rame Head.

Campsite Upgrades

There was steady progress on the upgrade program during the year including:

- Gringer Creek: Increased capacity to nine tent sites and improved paths.
- Murray: A second water tank installed in March 2024, enhancing water reliability.
- Yourdamung: Contract awarded to install a large sealed tank for the toilet.
- Harris Dam: Planning for the shelter extension and upgrade in September and October 2024.
- Tent site and path upgrades planned for Harris Dam, Yabberup, Boarding House, and Gregory Brook in 2024-2025.

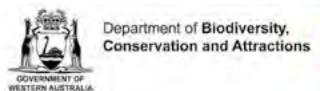

The Foundation ends the 2024 Financial Year in a strong financial position. Total income increased in 2024, and total expenses decreased. This led to a small profit, after we made a transfer to reserves, of just over \$5,000.

Income

The Foundation's income comes from a number of sources. We have worked towards this to help with a regular income stream for our operations and one in which we are not excessively reliant on a single source.

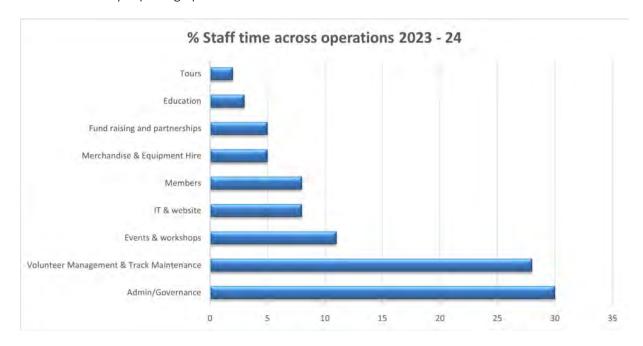

Memberships

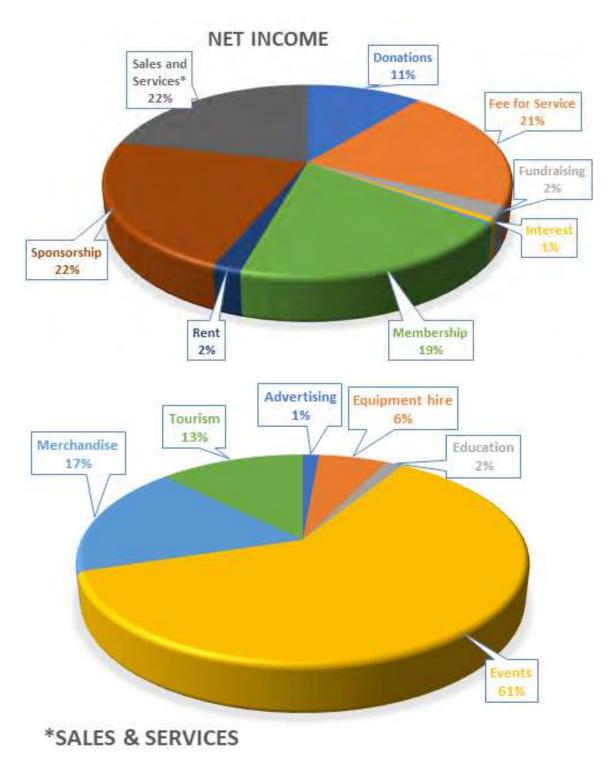
Member numbers increased slightly over the year. We actively survey departing members to understand their reasons and evaluate potential changes based on their feedback.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

NOTE 1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA). The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) INCOME TAX

The association is a non-profit organisation and income tax does not apply.

(b) PROPERTY PLANT AND EQUIPMENT (PPE)

Motor vehicles are carried at cost, less accumulated depreciation. Leasehold improvements, most office equipment and maintenance equipment are expensed at the time of purchase, in accordance with the Australian Taxation Office's ("ATO") immediate write off provisions.

Where applicable, the depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Where applicable, the leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements,

(c) IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period, the entity does not review the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired.

(d) PROVISIONS

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can reasonably be measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

(e) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of 4 months of less.

(f) REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive the dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains a commitment to receive the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST)

(g) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the shorter of the estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

(h) GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office ("ATO"). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Where applicable, receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

(i) TRADE AND OTHER PAYABLES

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

NOTE 2 NON-PROFIT SUB-ENTITY

The Bibbulmun Track Foundation is a community services income tax exempt non-profit organisation under Section 50.10 (Community Service) of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*. As such the Board may choose to treat separately identifiable activities as non-profit sub-entities for GST purposes in accordance with Section 63-5 of *A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999*.

The Board has previously chosen to treat its Calendar of Events activities as a non-profit sub-entity for GST purposes. The Board has not revoked this choice. The consequence of making this choice is that Calendar of Events activities are effectively taken out of the GST system. Calendar of Events income and expenses are not subject to GST and are treated as Input Taxed for GST purposes.

NOTE 3 CAPITAL RESERVE

The Foundation was required to surrender its YHA lease to the WA government in 2021 and received a lump sum capital payment as compensation.

The new premises at Aberdeen Street had a potential lease term of seven years. The benefit of the capital sum received was being brought to account as Rental Offset income of approximately \$35,000 per annum for the term of this lease.

In June 2023 the Foundation moved into its own premises at 62 Ord Street, West Perth, having relinquished its lease of the Aberdeen Street premises. As no further rent would be payable it was no longer appropriate to account for the capital sum as Rental Offset income. Approximately \$105,000 was brought to account as a capital gain in the 2023 profit and loss statement.

The remaining capital gain balance of \$70,000 has been brought to account in the 2024 profit and loss statement. However, \$35,000 has been transferred to a capital reserve to be kept aside to cover any unexpected expenses or losses in the future.

Bibbulmun Track Foundation Inc. Resolution of the Board for the year ended 30 June 2024

The Board of the BTF (Bibbulmun Track Foundation Inc.) has reviewed the records and governing rules of the BTF for the year ended 30 June 2024 and hereby confirms:
